

### Classroom Style

Rows of conference tables with chairs facing the front of the room (and the speaker), providing writing space for each person.

#### Application

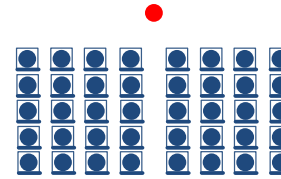
This room set-up is ideal for note taking, meetings requiring multiple hand-outs or reference materials, or other tools such as laptop computers. This is a comfortable set-up for long sessions and allows refreshments to be placed within reach of each attendee.

#### Advantages

The presenter can see all the participants  
Accommodates large groups in less space

#### Disadvantages

Interaction is minimal, except amongst neighbours and towards the speaker  
Many participants are looking at the backs of other participants



### Theatre Style

Chairs in rows facing a stage area, head table, or speaker (with no conference table).

#### Application

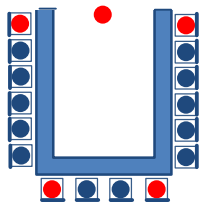
This is the most efficient set-up when the attendees will act as an audience. This set-up is not recommended for food events or if note taking is required.

#### Advantages

Good for large groups when reading/writing are not required

#### Disadvantages

Elevation changes needed for large groups  
No writing surface and minimal possibility for group interaction



### U Shape

A series of conference tables set in the shape of the letter U, with chairs around the outside.

#### Application

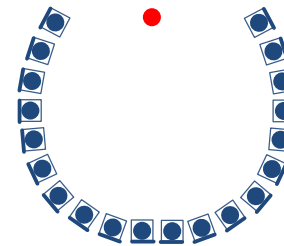
This layout style is often used for committee meetings, training courses and discussion groups where there is a speaker, audio-visual presentation or other focal point.

#### Advantages

Good work space, good interaction between participants and with the speaker  
Suitable when audio-visual or speakers are involved, but focus is on the speaker

#### Disadvantages

Not ideal for larger group



### Horseshoe Style

Chairs in a wide part-circle, or horseshoe, and with no tables.

#### Application

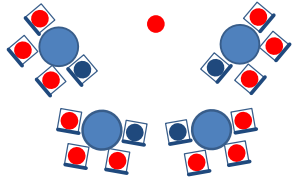
This layout removes the protective barriers of the tables and opens up the room to discussion

#### Advantages

Good for groups that wish to remove protocol and to create a more relaxing, sharing and contemplative atmosphere

#### Disadvantages

People may feel ill at ease if they are not accustomed to this kind of layout



### Cabaret Style

Chairs around tables in groups facing a screen or speaker

#### Application

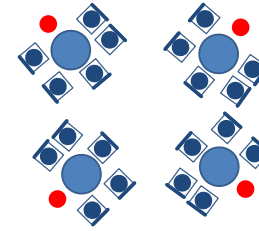
This set-up is the most suitable for a training course or a workshop, when there will be interactive group work and discussion.

#### Advantages

Teamwork is encouraged, groups can switch around easily, there is good communication and participation

#### Disadvantages

Many organisations have not set up their room space in way that allows this configuration (due to the shape of the room or the tables)



### Banquet Style

Chairs around tables in groups facing a flipchart and a group facilitator

#### Application

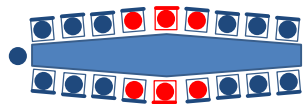
This set-up is appropriate for workshops where teams are formed and work on organizational issues.

#### Advantages

Teamwork is encouraged, groups can switch around easily, there is good communication and participation

#### Disadvantages

Many organisations have not set up their room space in way that allows this configuration (due to the shape of the room or the tables)



### Boardroom Style

A long table set up with chairs around the sides and a chair facing at least one end.

#### Application

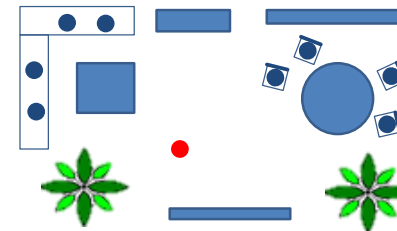
This layout is often used for Board of Directors meetings, committee meetings, and discussion groups.

#### Advantages

Good working atmosphere, discussion and interaction amongst participants

#### Disadvantages

Not ideal for audio-visual presentations, very unsatisfactory for speakers who tend to be excluded from the group discussions



### Workshop Layout

The whole area is laid out in a fashion that is pleasurable and stimulating for teamwork

#### Application

A specially designed workshop room could massively increase productivity, when generating ideas, resolving issues and making decisions that involved expert opinion.

#### Advantages

Teamwork is encouraged, participants can feel relaxed and energized, there is good communication and engagement

#### Disadvantages

Many organisations have not realised that the environment in which people work can greatly affect productivity.
